Our Club – Skill Development


Club coach supports athletes & coaches in:

- Rabbits Program (90, 12 coaches including senior racers who were great role models)
 - Bunnies, Rabbits, Extendos
- Athlete Development Program (36, 8 coaches)
 - Track Attack
 - Biathlon
 - Junior Development & Senior Racers
- Masters Program (50+, 7 coaches)
 - Drop-in, Masters Race & Masters Lite
- School Program (790 student visits, 10 coaches)



Club Coach

- Chris Werrell has been head coach since 2010-11
- Funding a paid coach has paid off:
 - High calibre coaching and program direction
 - Training & support for volunteer coaches
 - Role model for athletes





What Works: Program Integration

- Biathlon integrated within Athlete Development Program since 2010
 - Cross-program support results in better biathletes and retention of young teens.
 - Organizational efficiencies (races, admin)
- This year all Skills Development programs are integrating: ADP, Rabbits, Masters and Schools
 - More support from club coach
 - Masters share some practices with race team
 - Coordinated coach training

Self-sufficiency

- Membership fees cover operating expenses
- Program budgets strive to break even
- Programs autonomous during year if within budget
- Any end-of-year surplus goes to club unless carry forward endorsed by board
- Capital improvements rely on fundraising

Planning ahead

- Operating budget includes funding towards major maintenance & replacement of capital
- Priorities established by 5 year strategic plan and 3 year capital expenditures plan

Challenges: Grant Eligibility

o The Challenge:

 Grant criteria can penalize a financially prudent club (e.g. having savings for equipment replacement)

Our approach:

- A board resolution can restrict funds for specific capital projects and not count as cash in the bank.
- Status of restricted funds needs to be monitored (We lost a grant when a term expired on restricted funds.)
- Look for other sources of funding. Eg corporate wellness program



Challenges: Distance from Other Clubs

o Challenges:

- Travel cost and time to southern events (12 hours driving in good conditions)
- Safety concerns regarding winter highway travel over vast distances (odds are...)
- Reluctance of southern clubs to attend our events

Our approach:

- Encourage cooperation among Northern clubs for events (e.g. Northern Teck Cup Race Series. Shared timing equipment, shared expensive waxes?)
- Focus younger kids on local races
- Keep telling southern clubs that the best conditions are consistently at BV Nordic Centre



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Challenges: Volunteer Recruitment

o The Challenge:

 Running our club relies on lots of highly committed volunteers but turnover is inevitable

Our approach:

- Continually recruit new volunteers within programs
- Provide documentation for new program coordinators
- Tell the stories of our key volunteers in newsletters
